Ten Years Removing Marine Debris from the Great Egg

Starting in 2014, the Great Egg Harbor River Council partnered with Stockton University, the City of Somers



Point, and the National Park Service to remove ghost crab traps (pots) from the Great Egg Harbor Bay. This was a 2-year project, and hundreds of ghost crab traps were recovered and disposed of.

Greg Gregory, Chair of the Great Egg Harbor River Council, led a volunteer team for the removal of the first abandoned/ derelict vessel from the marsh in Somers Point on 2/1/2018. PVC rollers were employed to minimize damage to the marsh, and the Somers Point Public Works Department took





landfill. The Somers Point Mayor and Council passed a resolution thanking the volunteers.

I launched an investigation after receiving a complaint in March of 2020, that large amounts of construction debris were floating down the river from a mysterious abandoned houseboat that was falling apart. During that investigation I not only found the floating remains of the derelict houseboat, but also, many other large

marine debris items on the marsh. This situation demonstrated the need for a full-fledged marine debris


program on the Great Egg Harbor River.



...continued from page 1 Brooke Fisher (aka Brooke Handley), joined the Great Egg Harbor Watershed Association as the first Marine Debris Program Intern in October of 2020. She created our marine debris

program which includes an inventory of docks, boats and other large marine debris, some of which was "legacy" debris that had been on the marsh for many years. By physically searching the marsh and studying aerial photography on Google Earth the inventory of items listed on the map was created.

We then contracted with Young Lemon LLC to create an interactive online inventory of all our marine debris items that included GPS locations, pictures, and descriptions. You can access this data on GEHWA's website at www.gehwa.org/gehwa-mission-map.



After determining that some of the items found probably had owners that might want to be reunited with their property, a letter was sent to all upstream riverfront property owners. Brooke included information in the letter regarding the need for their assistance in preventing new marine debris from getting into the river and a link to the online marine debris inventory showing the extent of the problem and also to serve as a sort of lost and




found resource.

These two marine debris items were successfully returned to their owners.



Brooke led a volunteer "Tug of War on the Tuckahoe" in April of 2021 to remove an abandoned boat near Mosquito Landing on the Tuckahoe River. Upper Township's BSA Troop 79 provided much needed muscle to move the boat from the marsh and up to the parking lot at Mosquito Landing so that it could be disposed of by the Upper Township Road Department.

...continued from page 2 In May of 2021, the Great Egg Harbor River Council sent a request to Stockton University to conduct another side scan sonar inventory of all the lost crab pots in the Great Egg Harbor Bay west of the Garden State Parkway. Stockton did the survey in December of 2021. The lost crab pot survey points were then given to the Somers Point Crab Company for their recovery and disposal. By 5/2/2022, 68 lost pots had been removed from the Great Egg Harbor National and Scenic Recreational River.



We continued our search for abandoned/

derelict marine debris. On 4/14/2022, Brooke and I found a derelict tandem kayak on the Great Egg Harbor River and hauled it out for restoration. Also on 4/14/2022, a reporter from the Press of Atlantic City, Vernon Ogrodnek, joined us, and after interviewing Brooke and I, took pictures that can be accessed by: **Googling - "Press of AC** <u>GALLERY: Of Abandoned Boats</u>". The Editors of the Press of AC also published an article on 4/28/2022 about the abandoned boats issue that can be accessed by: **Googling - "Press of AC NJ must** <u>quit ignoring its abandoned boats</u>". Then on 5/1/2022, the Press of AC published an article by Vernon Ogrodnek that featured our marine debris program in considerable detail, that can be access by: **Googling - "Press of AC <u>Abandoned and derelict boats more</u>**





<u>than just eyesores</u>".

We then found and removed 2 abandoned/ derelict Sunfish sailboats from the marsh/river, one on each of the dates 4/29/2022 and 5/3/2022. Brooke and I towed the first one off the Tuckahoe River to Upper Township. The second one was recovered from the Great Egg Harbor River with the help of Egg Harbor Township River Councilor, David Brown. Both were towed to the landfill.

In a joint effort on 5/15/2022, led by Upper Township (UT) River Councilor Bill Handley, the Upper Township Public Works Department and over 20 volunteers towed 6 large marine debris docks from the Tuckahoe River to Mosquito Landing. The volunteers deconstructed the docks and stacked it for disposal by UT Public Works.

The work was not done removing abandoned/ derelict marine debris. In the fall of 2024 we addressed the issue of 3 un-floatable legacy derelict vessels abandoned on the marsh of the Great Egg Harbor National Scenic and Recreational River. We contracted with Shamrock Towing to remove 2 of those vessels.



On 12/10/24, Shamrock Towing removed and disposed of a long narrow FRP boat that was discovered on the marsh on 3/21/21. They also removed and disposed

There is still one large derelict metal work barge that remains to be removed. It is located on the phragmites choked marsh of Stephen Creek. The barge is approximately 30 ft. long by 10 ft. wide. It has been at this marsh location for 10 years. It is unlikely to be floatable and may need to be dismantled in place. At this time, we do not have a contract for removal.

Our work is not done. Moving forward, our next challenge for our "Marine Debris Program" will be to advocate for better rules and regulations and a mechanism for removing newly abandoned boats as soon as they are discovered.


